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

Beyond Selfies

Tips on Shooting for Social Media By Sheila Catilo

Zone V's Z Academy has become a treasure trove of knowledge for members. The session last Feb. 18, 2021 was no exception. Entitled Beyond Selfies - tips on shooting for social media, the talk was given by our very own Sheila Catilo.

Given the types of topics in the past Z Academy seminars, the thought did cross my mind to skip this one. However, considering that we're enveloped in a completely digital world where social media reigns supreme; I decided to attend just the same. And man, was I glad I did!

Like the masterful storyteller that she is, Sheila took the Zombies through a journey. Starting with the basics of what social media is and what people use it for, she then slowly eased us into the whys of social media; to connect, to share your work, to be inspired or simply access the community for support. Grounded on those fundamentals Sheila then spoke of the benefits and woes behind social media. Quickly shifting gears, she spoke about how to make good content; one that exhibits consistency, relevant and entertaining.

In her talk, Sheila reminded us not so much of the rules or technicalities of photography, but the reasons underpinning it. Tips like, when shooting - be clear with your intention, define your message (faithful to your brand), and then design the aesthetics - composition, lighting, mood, etc. These are well established guidelines



and yet are drowned in the minutiae of shutter speeds, aperture, and inverse square law; or worse, which lens to use for which shot.

And since her talk was about social media Sheila did not fail to add pointers in this realm as well; to have the target platform in mind as you shoot; for example, square format for IG,

styling your shots and adding props to provide context to every shot. She shared proven methods in growing social media followers and debunked others. She gave us Zombies a fresh perspective and a reason to pickup and dust off our stagnant social media feeds and start creating and sharing again.

Her parting shot: Choose your poison; be it Instagram, Facebook, Twitter. Whatever you choose - go out and tell your story and be an inspiration to someone.

Sheila Catilo is a lifestyle photographer and entrepreneur with a passion for visual storytelling. On a more personal note, Sheila was born in Imus, Cavite and is the proud mother to three wonderful daughters and a partner to a very supportive husband, Jorem Catilo, also a Zone V member. Finding Your Vision

Z Academy's 5th offering for the year was an introspective discussion on "finding one's vision" as a photographer and artist.

Led by fine art photographer and gallery printing specialist, Red Ognita, the March 4th zoom seminar aimed to encourage the members to "know oneself" as a photographer and/or visual art creator. The process of self-discovery, of knowing one's vision, is a way to establish one's artistic identity.

At the start of the session, Red, who has a self-effacing and apologetic demeanor despite being a well-recognized/admired artist and coach within the local fine art photography community, including some of the Zombies, predicated his talk by saying that the topic "finding one's vision" is one of the most difficult for him to tackle. This in part is, because "vision" is a personal, subjective, and

even, an abstract concept, especially for those who are still exploring their identity as artists. He quickly dispelled misconceptions that, "Vision" is

- Not a trendy thing; it is organic in that it is part of one's identity;
- Not superficial, it is a well developed and deeply ingrained personal approach;
- It is not the same as style but one's "distinct" style emanates from vision.

In his case, Red admits that it took him years of trials & errors, heart-breaking instances, and gutsy mining of opportunities fired by passion and sheer desire to find his niche, to be able to finally say that he had found his anchor as an artist. Recalling his own self-discovery phase and emphasizing the importance of a "third eye", from a mentor or coach, who can objectively guide and critique



at same time, Red encouraged the members to never stop before even trying.

In the discovery of one's vision, Red noted that one naturally goes through a process of exploration. When one eventually matures, then one can find a niche, where one's body of work becomes the voice that speaks for one as artist.

In the self-discovery process, Red suggested that we ask ourselves these questions:

- Do I know what I like to shoot
- Do I have focus in my choices of subjects?

 Will I still shoot even if no one will see my photographs?

- Do my photos/portfolio speak a certain language to others; do they convey a sense of unity and coherence?
- Do I have strong photos that I can associate with distinct moments or times I consider memorable?
- Am I doing what everyone else is doing, simply mimicking the masters or am I separating from the trend?

On questions raised by some members, Red shared his insights:

- "As a young shooter, one wants to try all genres and subjects. When will one know that it's time to focus?" (From Bern)
- ~ When what you do becomes easier and makes you happy; when what you do loves you back and you reap returns, that is a sign that what you are doing is already what you're supposed to focus on.
- "What if my heart loves many genres underwater, landscapes, aerial do I have to concentrate on only one?" (From Keisie)

~ You need to examine your images and figure out which ones are "strongest". To be objective, ask for a second opinion because as shooters, we tend to associate the value of our images to the difficulty of creating it. So you can't separate the emotion from the "pure beauty" of the image. From your strong photos, you will know where your focus can be.

"I don't really know if my photos are art or not. As a travel photographer, I try to present my images with journalistic semblance. How do I muster the courage to finally present myself as an artist?" (From this author)

~ Dare to show your works even when you know you might be criticized. Prepare yourself for the worst. When you believe you are ready to embrace that, then you are ready to present your portfolio and in a way, reveal who you are as artist. Share both your commissioned and personal works, so that audiences will know your range.

In closing, Red reminded the group:

 That discovering one's vision requires knowing onself, one's strong points, and one's motives/ intentions.

- That integrity is also key. Doing something even when no one else knows or cares and staying consistent in what one does will be tough but personal discipline pays off. When one is true to oneself, the images will have meaning that are personal and may or may not be understood by or imminent to others.
- To share what you do anyway even when faced with hurdles, because it helps you to sharpen yourself. Keep going anyway; your photos will eventually become a representation of your artistic identity.
- In art, what happens before the artwork is done doesn't matter.
 What matters is whether the output is something that is appreciated or makes you happy with yourself.
- One's truthful work is one's voice, that is one's vision in full display.

Z Academy Updates

Z Academy hosted two excellent seminars last January 21st and February 4th, bannered by two of the best in their respective fields in photography.

The first seminar on "The Essentials of Cinematic Effect Photo Editing" was conducted by no less than internationally renowned Indonesian master photographer and visual artist Rarindra Prakarsa. Streaming live from his home studio in

Indonesia, Rarindra demonstrated his essential photo editing workflow, using Adobe Camera Raw and Photoshop, for achieving his signature "cinematic" images. In the seminar, Rarindra showed and explained how he thoughtfully and logically uses editing tools like global and local dodge & burn, sliders for highlights & shadows, color grading, and sharpening, to enhance a photo's ambience and focus on subject. The coaching session with Rarindra was especially appreciated by members, who have until then, not yet fully known how certain tools and sliders in the adobe editing apps can be used to create enhancements. The post-seminar excitement was palpable, with members gushing over how they picked up new inspiration and techniques to up their editing game. A simple online search for


Rarindra's works will reveal his mastery of transforming ordinary visuals of life into extraordinary, painting-like depictions. It is hard not to be amazed by the surrealist effect of his renditions.

The second seminar, "Beyond Ambient Light" was spearheaded by renowned wedding and portrait photographer, light master, and Sony brand ambassador

Jiggie Alejandrino, who did an on-the -spot demonstration at his home studio, on his basic techniques of portraiture lighting. Jiggie's impressive wedding portfolio has a strong following here and abroad because of the way he artfully and cleverly combines artificial and ambient lights to enhance the overall look and feel of his well-conceptualized shoots. Jiggie, who is also currently brand ambassador of Phottix pro and Zeiss camera lenses, has worked in many dreamy locations here and abroad for both pre-nup and wedding shoots. A visit to his website also feels like getting a glimpse of your travel bucket list. For the Z Academy seminar, Jiggie chose to do a live shooting cum image curating session, with his beautiful wife as the model. Jiggie clearly

explained and showed various setups for bringing out the best in the subject, by using only one light.

Both virtual seminars were well attended by enthusiastic members, who showed their appreciation of the subject matters by actively participating in Q&A. The Z Academy, launched only this year, as a learning platform for Zone V members, has lined up many more seminars for the rest of the year, which are expected to be just as engaging and value adding to the members' skills arsenal.
